Pulse Point app saves a life

KENNETT SQUARE » During the evening of Nov.7 in the heart of downtown Kennett Square a man endured a frightening experience. He found a friend in her car; she looked like she was dead.

The man immediately called 911, the first step in the "Chain of Survival" that triggered a complex series of notifications. According to the American Heart Associa-

tion of cardiac arrest and activation of the emergency response system, is the responsibility of "lay rescuers." The second link is immediate high-quality CPR.

Chester County EMS units are well prepared for such emergencies. In 2018 Chester County Department of Emergency Services worked with the Chester County Commissioners and purchased PulsePoint for the county. PulsePoint is linked to the county's 911 medic/Captain of Longwood Fire system and monitors emergency calls throughout the county, watching for cardiac arrest dispatches. When someone needs CPR those who have the application on their phone are alerted that CPR is needed close by their

"When trained people provide CPR before the ambulance arrives the patient has a better outcome," said Matthew Eick, Para-

On Nov. 7 the system worked exactly how it was intended. Before the Basic Life Support Ambulance from Kennett Fire Company and Paramedics from Longwood Fire Company were even dispatched to the call, help was on the way. At the Kennett Inn, near the incident, two firefighters with CPR training from Po-APP » PAGE 8

Nine months after Super Bowl win, hospital sees record births

WEST CHESTER » The newest Eagles fans are entering the world at the Chester County Hospital.

Sunday marks exactly nine months since the Eagles won the Super Bowl, and officials at the Chester County Hospital say they have had the highest number of births in the month of October, and November looks like it is on track to break a record too.

"We have had the highest number of births (255) we have had in more than 15 years," said

Fran Doyle, director of maternity health services at the hospital. "Last night we had eight deliveries in the course of eight hours. Normally, we have eight deliveries in a day."

People like celebrating, especially during a big event like a Super Bowl, and that could explain the uptick in births, Doyle said. "Obstetricians are telling me

that we should expect an increase in the number of births (in November), so we are gearing up," Doyle said.

a photograph of a rescued dog and each chapter was contributed by a unique individual or family.

To date, more than \$2,500 has been donated to several of the featured rescue shelters. Nine hundred dollars worth of books was donated for organizations to sell.

"Many rescue dogs are happier," Capuzzi said, "They often come from such a tough life.

"You often don't know what they came from. They definitely have a heightened sense of appreciation and are gratified."

Stella is a mixed breed and likely a border collie/ Australian Shepherd mix and was a puppy, at less than a year old, when Stella moved into her forever home with the Capuzzi's.

Capuzzi is considering heading off to college next fall and will not take Stella with her. During a phone call interview, the high school senior reported that Stella was on her back receiving lovins and rubs on her belly.

"I'll miss her—that's going to be the toughest part about going away to school," Capuzzi said.

At 16. Capuzzi started working at Dr. Brenda Perkins' West Chester Animal Hospital on Pottstown Pike, While employed at the hospital, during a five or six month time period, the Capuzzi's were without a pooch after the passing of German Shepherd Zoe.

'I was surrounded by all these dogs," she said. "It opened my eyes so much to all the demeanors, personalities and traits of the rescue dogs that board (at the hospital).

Father Mike Capuzzi said he is proud of Caroline, who during summer vacation decided to do something helpful and meaningful.

"To date, she has been able to help people share their dog rescue stories and raise money for dogs in need," Mike Capuzzi said. "I hope other kids are inspired by what she has done and create their own helpful effort.

The ultimate goal of the book is to encourage people to consider visiting an animal shelter the next time they are looking for a new friend.

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals estimates that nationally shelters take in 6.5 million animals per year. Roughly 3.3 million are dogs.

Although numbers have declined, 670,000 dogs are euthanized each year.

'The increase in adoptions and return of animals to their owners has aided in that decrease," wrote Capuzzi in the book's introduction.
